
Well done Takara, it's great to hear so much enthusiasm from such a young fisher.

DPIPWE have already identified some issues for consideration and these are available from their website.



Parks Water and Environment (DPIPWE) has announced the commencement of the Scalefish Rules Review process. A new management plan for the scalefish fishery needs to be in place by November 2014.

Details of the process and how you can have input and present your views, issues and thoughts are available from the DPIPWE website.

A draft set of rules is expected to be released for public comment around April 2014. TARFish encourages all fishers to submit their input early so that it can be considered before the draft rules are released.

The government and industry have been liaising in recent months on the completion of a Biotoxin Management

Plan which will be used to manage any escalation in Biotoxin levels should it occur over the coming season.

COMMONWEALTH FISHING

TARFish met with the CEO of Australian Fisheries Management Authority (AFMA) recently to discuss updates on Southern Bluefin Tuna, Striped Trumpeter and other important recreational fish species. "AFMA is responsible for the efficient and sustainable management of Commonwealth fish resources on behalf of the Australian community." AFMA and recreational fishing peak bodies across Australia have entered a closer working relationship over recent months in our endeavours for increased recognition of the importance of recreational fishing in the broader fishing industry.



AUSTRALIAN RECREATIONAL FISHING FOUNDATION

The Australian Recreational Fishing Foundation (ARFF) has recently launched the first Charter for Recreational Fishing in Australia.

ARFF notes "With over 5 million Australians going fishing each year, recreational fishing ranks as our largest participation sport and lifestyle activity. Recent estimates reveal that Australians spend more than \$10 billion annually on recreational fishing and much of it is spent in rural and regional Australia." FREE JUNIOR LOGBOOK


